Georgia Historical Society's Georgia Days 2007

The celebration of the founding of the Colony of Georgia at Savannah on February 12, 1733 by James Edward Oglethorpe has been a tradition among Georgians since 1734. Each year at the founding, GHS celebrates all of Georgia's history and understanding encourages а better of and appreciation for Georgia history among the people of our state. To that end, the Georgia Historical Society seeks to promote the study and preservation of our state's rich history and the historical sites, documents, and other materials that offer a window on that past.

This year's Georgia Days honoree, Abraham Baldwin, was born in Connecticut in 1739. Baldwin arrived in Georgia in 1783 and established a successful law practice in Augusta. Though his intentions for coming to Georgia are unclear, he quickly entered Georgia politics, winning election to the state's General Assembly. Baldwin had a life-long interest in education, believing it vital to the development of the state. He wrote the charter for the establishment of the first state-supported university in the nation and saw it adopted by the legislature in January 1785. Baldwin served as the first president of this university, which became the University of Georgia. In 1787 he became one of two Georgians to sign the new U.S. Constitution at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia. He also served in the U.S. House and Senate in the early years of the new republic.



Circuit Rider Archivist Informational Meetings

Are you overwhelmed with old files? Are you unsure what records you can keep and which you can toss? Do you have precious, historical documents but are unsure how to preserve them? The Circuit Rider Archivist can help. The Georgia Archives, in conjunction with the Georgia Historical Records Advisory Board and Clayton State University, launched the Circuit Rider Archivist program in 2005 to assist local governments and historical societies, museums, and libraries in Georgia with managing archives and records. Through the program, an experienced archivist counseled over 60 organizations on issues ranging from the proper environment for the preservation of letters from the Civil War to efficient use of storage space.

Now, the Circuit Rider Archivist is preparing for a second round of visits and will be conducting a series of informational meetings to acquaint local governments—including county and municipal governments, courts, and school systems—historical societies, libraries, and museums with the program and how it could help them. These informational meetings will be hosted by organizations previously visited by the Circuit Rider Archivist, and representatives from these groups will be on hand to talk about how the program benefited them. Refreshments will be provided.



From the Stacks A New Years Resolution You Can't Afford Not to Keep

In 2007, make it your organizational resolution to create or update your disaster plan. In the wake of large-scale natural disasters such as Hurricane Katrina, the amount of resources for disaster preparedness, response, and recovery for cultural institutions are more readily available than ever. With the accessibility of these resources, there is no excuse for organizations responsible for the longterm preservation of cultural and historical materials not to create institutional or departmental disaster plans (with the support and cooperation of your administration, of course.)

Disaster plans can range from basic to comprehensive – depending on the staff, time, and resources of your organization. At the most simplistic level, a disaster plan should include the names and contact information of all staff members, emergency response organizations (at the local, state, and federal levels), and utility vendors. When creating a preparedness plan be sure to include actions to secure your office equipment and files as well as the library, archival, or museum items in your care.

In addition to having a disaster plan in place, practicing the following procedures will enhance your preparedness and create awareness among staff and administration. Get into the habit of scheduling these activities at the beginning of the calendar or fiscal year:

- To help ensure that the daily operations of your facility can resume in a timely manner after a disaster, back-up computer files on an off-site server or on discs that are kept offsite or in a secure area.
- Schedule regular maintenance checks of your building, security, and fire suppression system and keep administration aware of any problems in order to prevent disasters due to facilities, security, or equipment issues.
- Schedule semi-annual inventory of recovery supplies and replenish as necessary.
- Create a recovery priority list of your library, archives, or museum materials and update as needed. The information in the list should

be conveyed in a way that is easily understandable by commercial emergency recovery companies or recovery staff and volunteers who are unfamiliar with your building.

- Assign a staff member or two to stay up to date on and share disaster preparedness, response, and recovery tips and assistance from emergency response and professional organizations.
- Update your disaster plan annually and be sure to provide the Georgia State Archives with a print copy of your plan. This is a free off-site storage option that guarantees a copy of your plan will be accessible during a disaster if your local copies are not.
